Environmental official tells Congress, U.N. Predicts Disaster if Global Warming Not Checked

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP) — A senior U.S. environmental official told Congress and the United Nations today that global warming could wipe out the world's major food crops and cause the deaths of hundreds of millions of people.

The official, who spoke at a hearing on global warming in the U.S. House of Representatives, said that the world's major food crops, including wheat, rice, corn and soybeans, could be wiped out by the year 2100 if global warming continues at its current rate.

The official also said that the world's major cities, including New York, London, Tokyo and Sydney, could be wiped out by the year 2100 if global warming continues at its current rate.

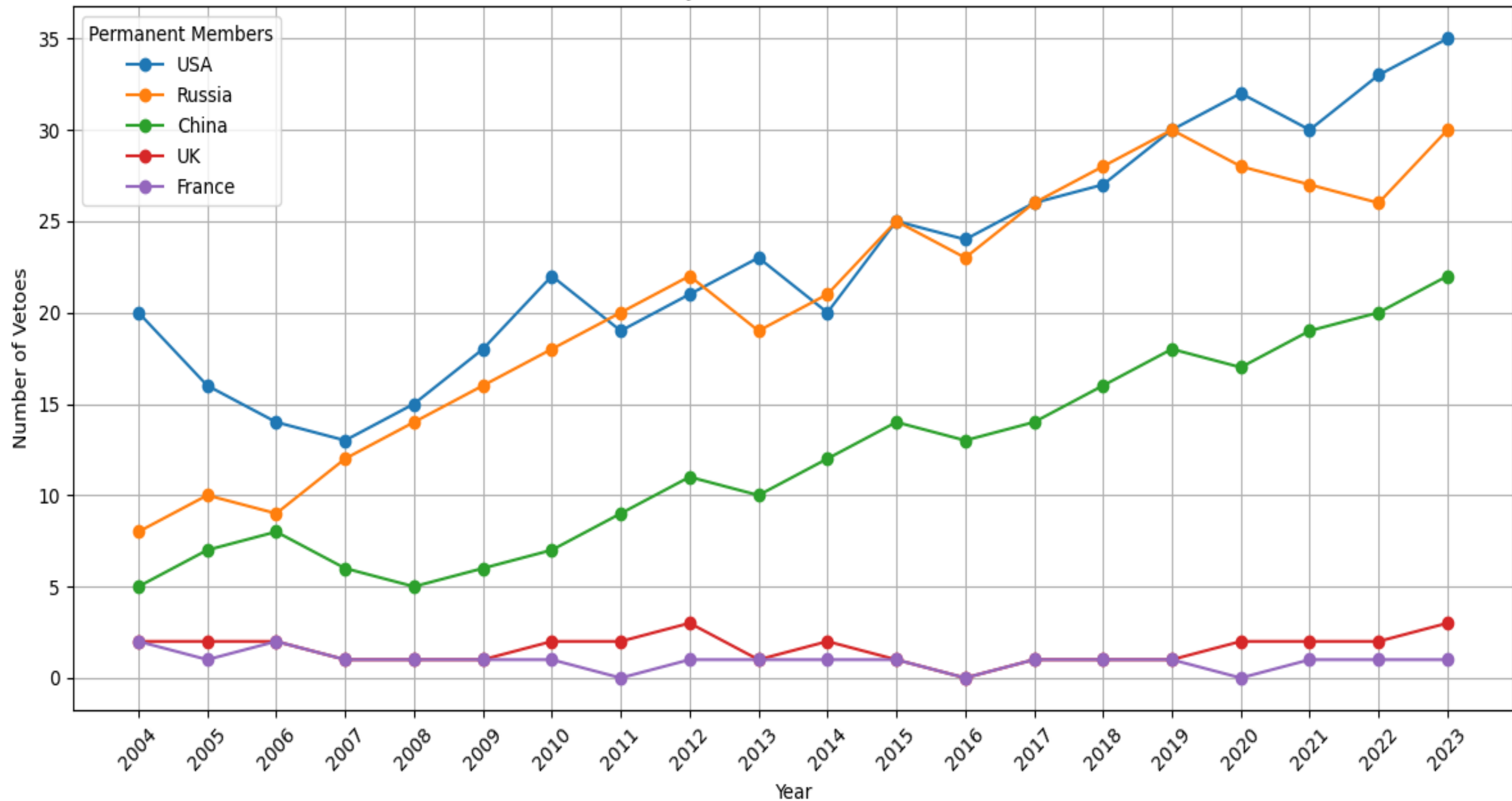

UN Security Council Vetoes (2004 - 2023)



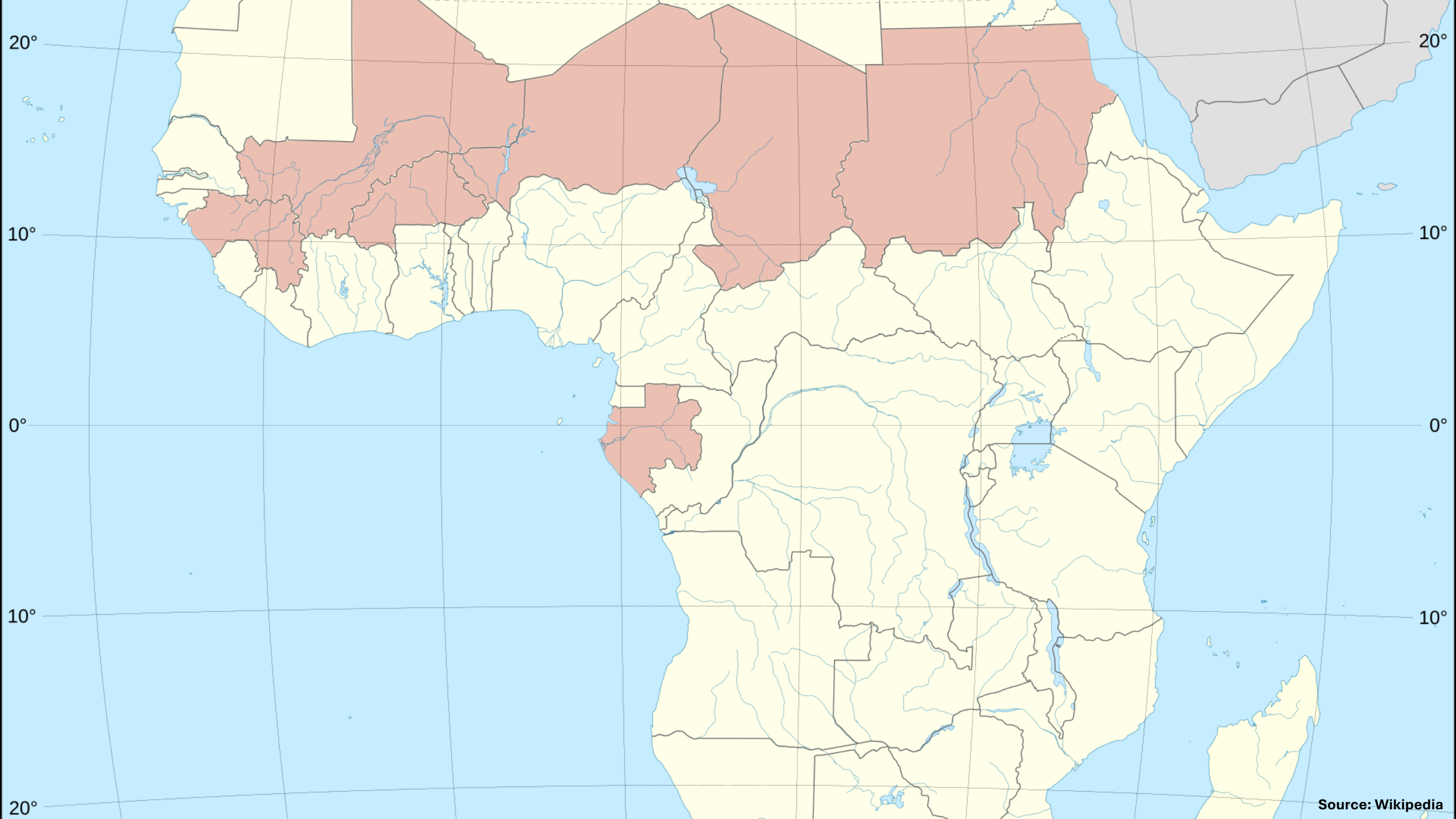

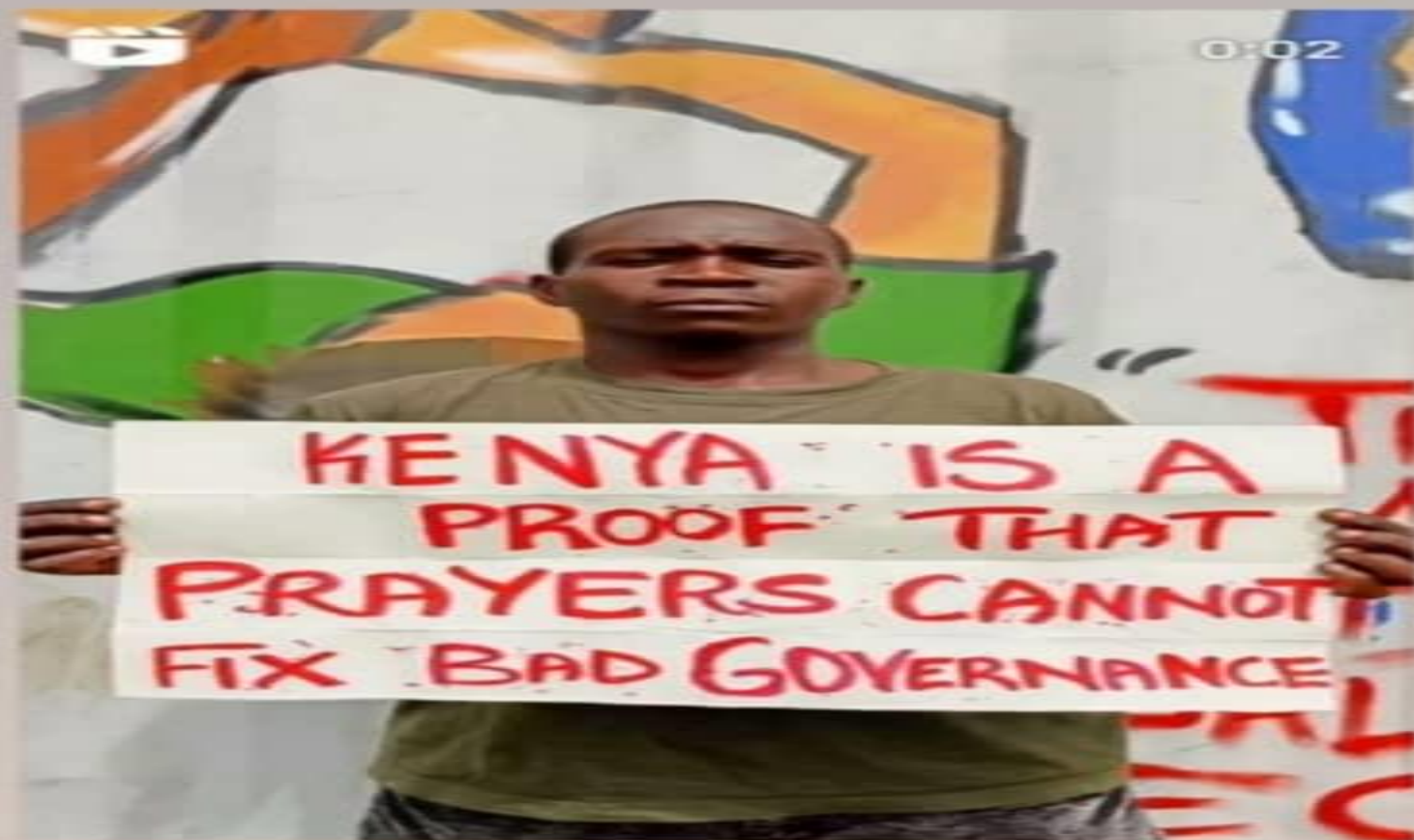

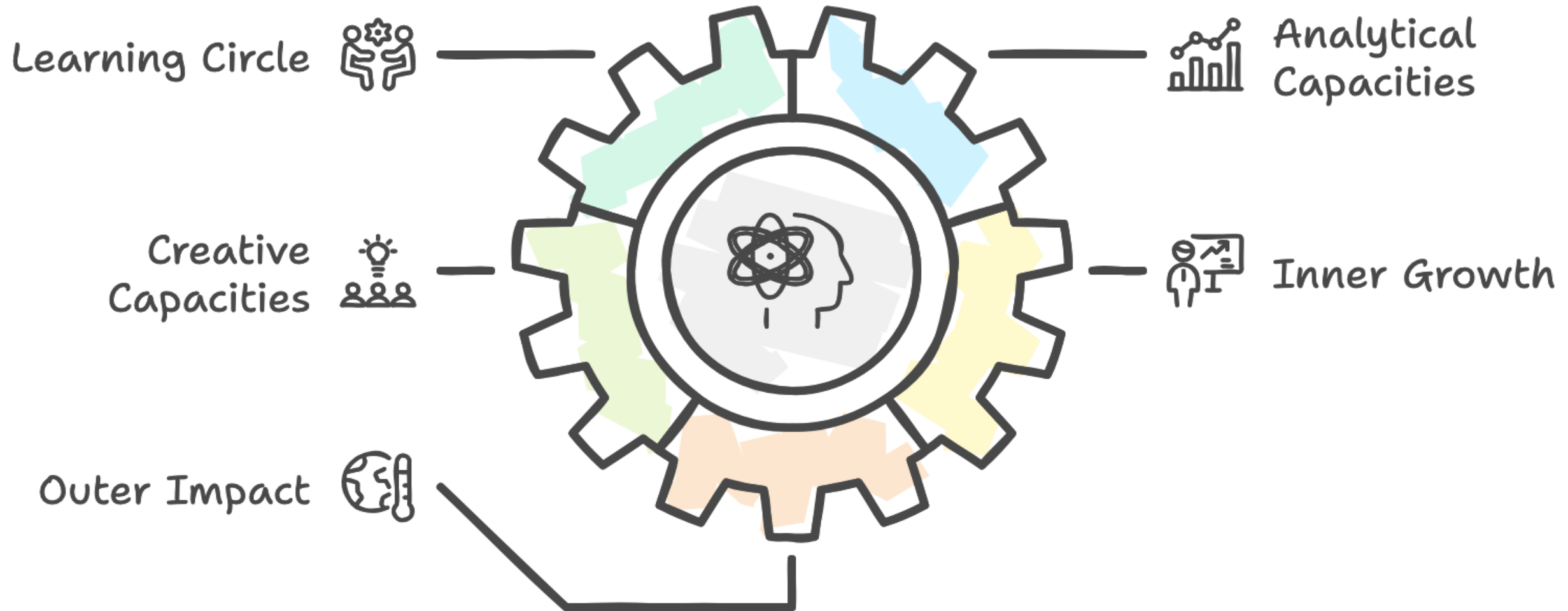
